Report from the President of the Common Ministry Council July 2015-June 2016

The school year 2015 started out well. Throughout the summer, Jessica Stokes, Director of the Common Ministry (CM), participated in WSU's Alive orientation sessions to introduce herself and the CM to new, incoming students and their parents. Also during the summer, Jessica Stokes, and a planning committee of community members were busy planning the Roger Williams Symposium to be held in October.

We welcomed Sister Simone Campbell, Executive Director of NETWORK, in Washington, D.C., and author of *A Nun on the Bus*, to Pullman for the Roger Williams Symposium on October 4 and 5, 2015. On October 4, Sr. Simone spoke at Gladish Community Center. She gave a workshop for community members at St. James Episcopal Church and a seminar at WSU's Thomas Foley Institute on October 5. All the sessions were well attended by community members and WSU students. This symposium would not have been successful without dedicated community members who served on the committee along with the CM Director, Jessica Stokes – Tim Paulitz, Francy Bose, Mary Beth Rivetti, and Jane Sielken.

On April 10, 2016 the 28th Annual Dinner Auction fundraiser was held at Banyans on the Ridge. Although the attendance has decreased steadily over the past couple of years, our supporters were very generous at the auction and helped us raise funds to support the operation of the CM. The committee members worked hard to put this event together. The committee members were Sue Durrrant, Nancy Nydegger, Barbara Hammond, Jessica Stokes, Amelia Craigen, and Emi Dickens.

In early April, Jessica Stokes notified the CM Council of her resignation from her position as Director of the CM to take on a new adventure in North Carolina. We are grateful for what she's done for the CM. The CM Council decided to keep the ministry going on a smaller scale, and is currently working to identify a new structure through which the mission of the CM can be carried out for the future.

At the end of the calendar year 2015, our budget ended with deficit as we had predicted. We've looked into ways to save money and put together 2016 budget with an understanding that we will start using funds from our investment funds.

As with many other non-profit organizations, we are facing a great challenge with our organization's financial state, and we have to come up with creative ways to sustain our ministry. The Council members are committed to the mission of the Common Ministry, and we are all grateful for the community members who support us in many ways.

Director's Report

This 2015-2016 has been a productive year for our ministry! We have stayed true to our mission of providing a safe space for spiritual development for all students and community members. Reflecting on this past year's events, programming, and collaborations fills me with feelings of pride for the Common Ministry at WSU. Our organization worked diligently in the Pullman-Moscow community through a myriad of efforts to advance inclusion and dignity for all people. Each effort, small-scale to large, was done with intentionality of our mission for the well-being of our community. The core of all our programming and collaborations was inclusive for all. Our students and community members were able to connect to social justice through thought-provoking conversations.

There are key events that naturally stand out, including our 36th Roger Williams Symposium, which featured Sister Simone Campbell, Executive Director of NETWORK in Washington, D.C. This two-day event offered plenty of opportunity to learn from Sister Simone Campbell on social-justice issues ranging from income disparity to healthcare advocacy. This symposium included three major events: the keynote speech/ town hall meeting at Gladish Community Center; a half-day workshop that included breakout sessions around Sister Simone's topics; an afternoon talk that was in collaboration with the Thomas Foley Institute. We are proud to have hosted Sr. Simone Campbell but more importantly thankful that we were able to bring her ideas and energy to, in turn, benefit Pullman. The Roger Williams Symposium also included a summer book club that community members enjoyed. The book club read Sister Simone's "A Nun on the Bus" in preparation for her visit.

The Common Ministry found strength in its programming with various collaborations on and off-campus. There are many collaborations but our strongest ties are with the Gender Identity/Expression and Sexual Orientation Resource Center at WSU, The WSU Wesleyan Foundation, Community Congregational United Church of Christ, St. James Episcopal Church, Pullman Islamic Center, the Evergreen Baptist Association, and the Residence Life Office at WSU to highlight a few. I had the opportunity to guest lecture and present various topics before classes and trainings on WSU's campus on interfaith dialogue, religiosity, and inclusivity. I also was able to speak to congregations through preaching. The Common Ministry was repeatedly called upon to provide services for the enhancement of student life. We are proud to be able to provide a needed and unique resource that no one else in Pullman currently provides. We are grateful to have good rapport with WSU, and their trust, as our shared work constantly intersects. A good portion of the year is reminding the community of our non-discriminatory mission as well invoking the trust that we have worked so hard to earn through our transparent and open ministry.

The Common Ministry's programming was varied and supported through the help of a student intern. We had our regular, bi-weekly, Interfaith Respite program which offered students a safe space to gather and discuss an entire host of topics. We covered topics ranging from civil rights, gender issues, LGBTQ+ advocacy, to Islamophobia. The mission of this program is to blend

matters of spirituality and philosophy with the needs for social justice that circuit them. The hope for the program is that students will be able to discuss, learn, and take the compassion and understanding they have attained into their other communities. This year we added a small group that was for students that self-identify as progressive Christians. This group was requested by students that wanted to look at scripture and issues through an ecumenical lens. We continued last year's young adult/graduate student group "Theology on Tap" which is an informally-structured group that meets around matters of spirituality, current events, and science; it is an interesting blend of interests and perspectives. This group will join the WSU Wesleyan Foundation's group "Grounds". In addition, the CM continued to host the monthly interfaith dialogue group that brings together clergy, WSU faculty, and other community leaders. We also enjoyed our annual student retreat, which took place in January at Camp Twinlow in Idaho. It was a weekend of outdoor recreation, rest, and discussions around all types of relevant topics. We had a great time learning and retreating with other college students from all over Eastern Washington.

Through our commitment to providing a safe space for spiritual development, the Common Ministry has been an anchor of inclusion and social justice in Pullman. We are thankful for the support we receive as we continue to live out our mission. Thank you.
